This year, the ERM Foundation is proud to celebrate 30 years of delivering meaningful impact and lasting change in local communities across the globe.

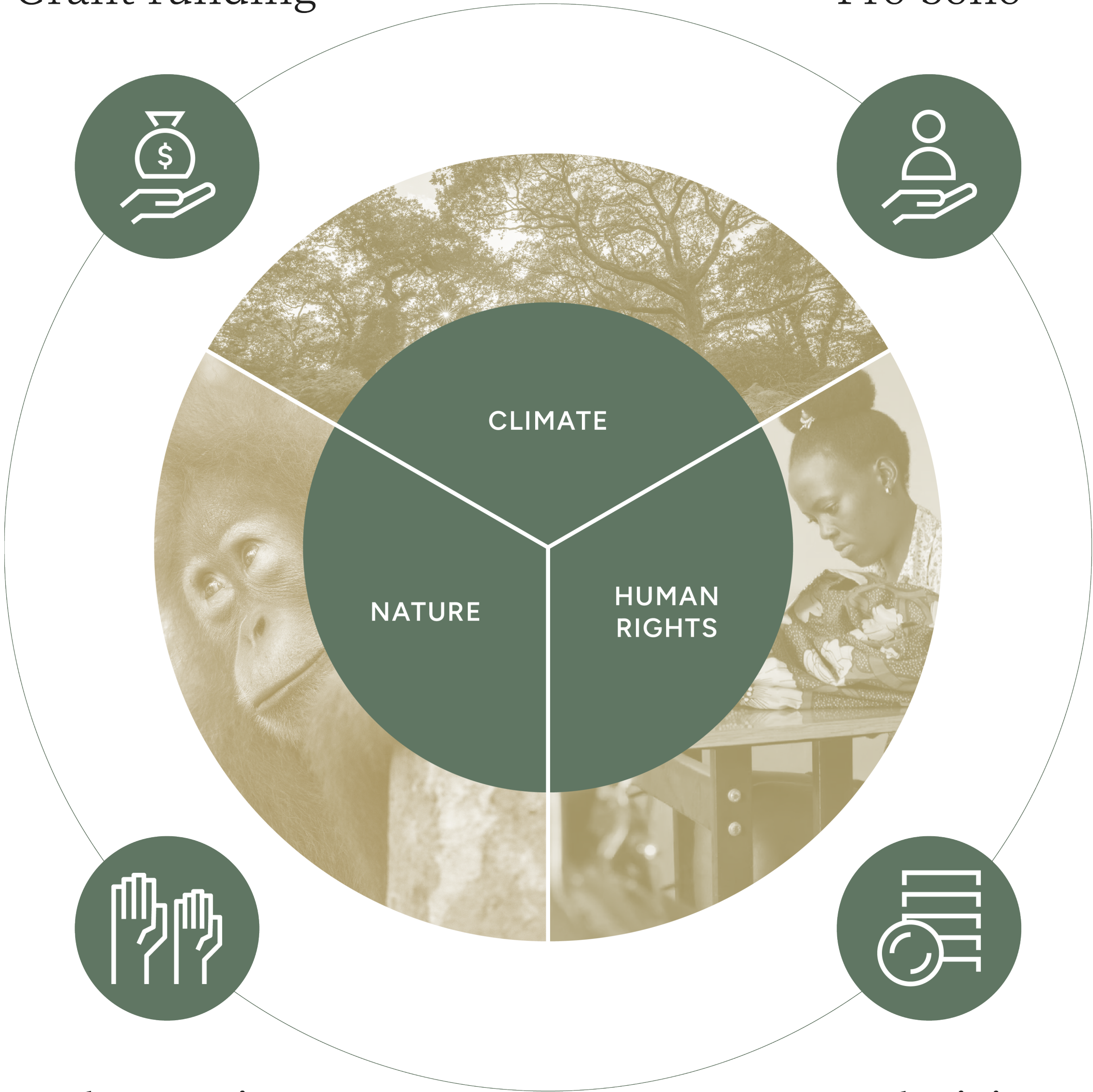

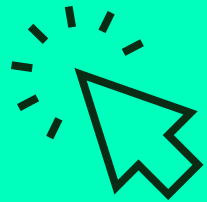

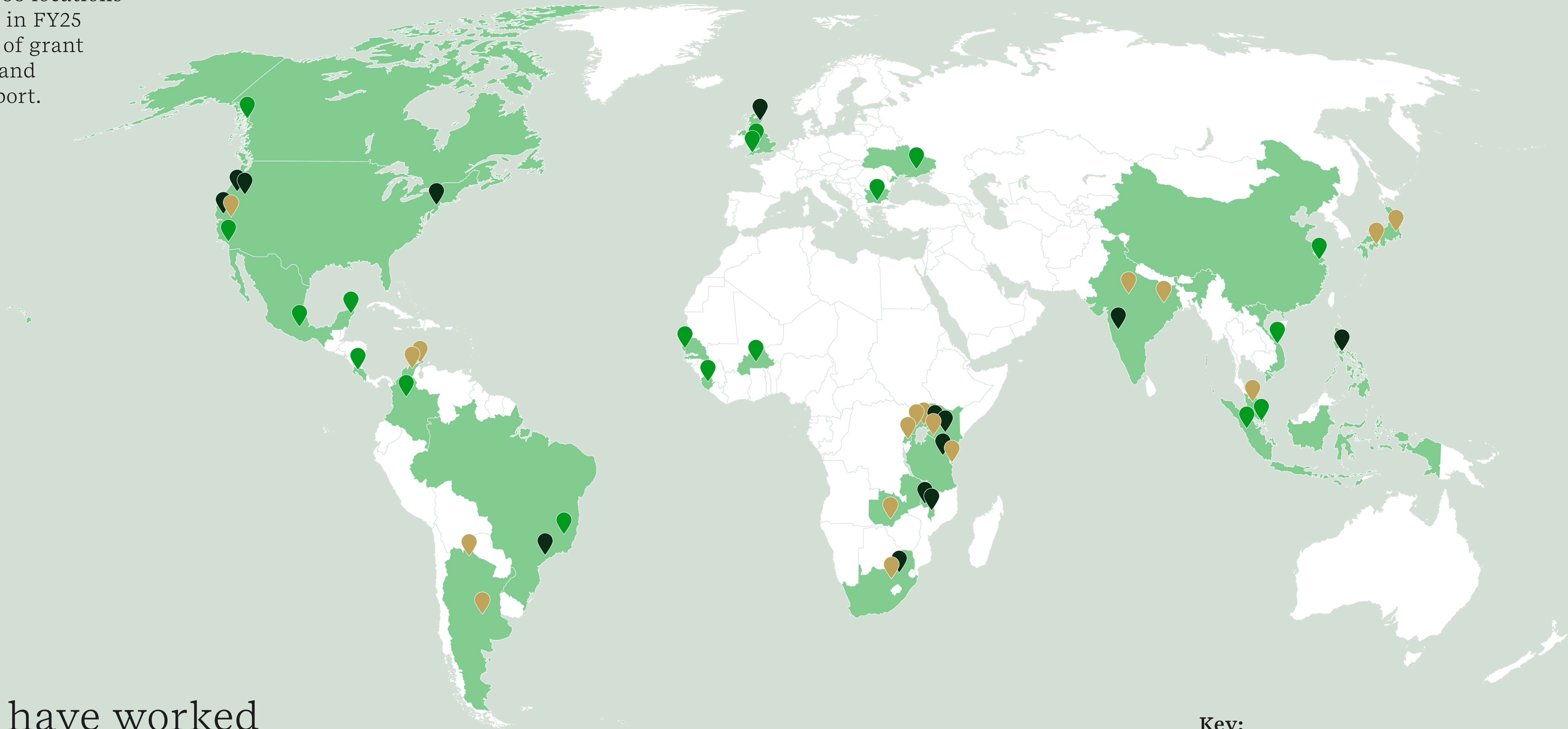

Pro bono support

The ERM Foundation’s pro bono program offers our employees a unique opportunity to use their expertise to collaborate with nonprofit organizations and social enterprises on meaningful projects which have a lasting impact, often in remote parts of the world. Employees at all levels from all areas of the world and business are encouraged to participate in technical pro bono work, developing their expertise and working for causes they support.

We believe that by providing professional pro bono support, we can deliver a greater impact than through grant funding alone. Pro bono work not only makes a tangible difference to local stakeholders but also supports training and skills development in the partner organizations we work with, creating lasting and sustainable change.

In FY25, employees globally have worked on pro bono projects across each of the Foundation’s focus areas through new and existing partnerships with eligible organizations.

Alma e Natureza, Soul and Nature in English, is based in the heart of Brazil’s threatened Atlantic Forest biome which has suffered deforestation of approximately 85% of its 130 million hectares. Currently, the area is internationally protected as a Biosphere Reserve through UNESCO. Alma e Natureza is working towards the environmental restoration of the Atlantic Forest, specifically in the Serra da Mantiqueira region and the transformation of local communities through regenerating biodiversity and boosting ecotourism activities.

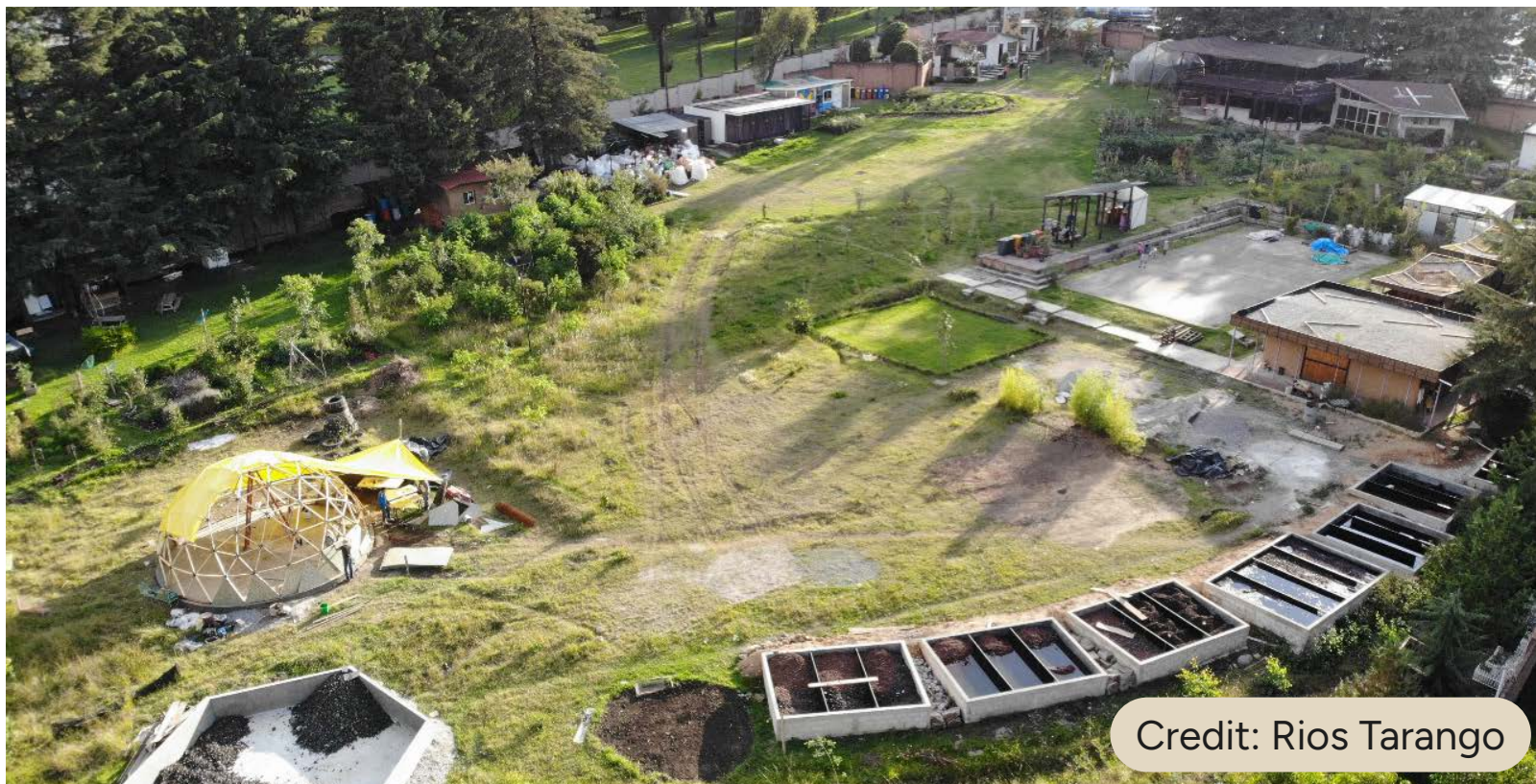
The ERM Foundation provided support by drawing on employees’ unique technical ability and local knowledge to develop a socioeconomic report which enables the organization to identify local initiatives and stakeholders for future engagement. Activities and projects with the greatest potential for restoring habitat and increasing social transformation were identified and mapped to relevant stakeholders to support the organization’s ability to plan and execute projects. The Foundation also provided a grant, which will enable Alma e Natureza to purchase the tools necessary to effectively engage with stakeholders in this project and beyond.

The ERM Foundation is proud to have partnered with Rios Tarango for a number of years. Rios Tarango works to support the restoration and regeneration of Mexican ecosystems, particularly in the Barranca de Tarango. This year, we provided technical pro bono expertise to develop a water quality monitoring protocol for the evaluation and maintenance of wetland in Tarango. The wetland is a crucial part of the local habitat, helping to sanitise the Puerta Grande river and promoting the reuse of water.

Our team of technical experts supported in conducting preliminary research, identifying key stakeholders for engagement and developing a plan to outline the process to be undertaken in conflict geographies across the world.

The Environmental Foundation for Africa (EFA)’s mission is to empower the people of West Africa to conserve and protect the richly bio-diverse and threatened ecosystems of the Guinean Forests of West Africa Hotspot.

In FY25, ERM supported EFA with technical pro bono time to develop educational posters promoting the ‘dos and don’ts’ for conservation nature and protecting forests in the area, in particular, highlighting the negative impacts of slash and burn farming. These posters supplemented EFA’s environmental awareness programs, through which it engaged with the local communities across the south-eastern region of Sierra Leone, where the Gola Rainforest National Park and Tiwai Island Wildlife Sanctuary are situated. This work will support the Government of Sierra Leone’s application to UNESCO to secure World Heritage Site status Gola-Tiwai Complex, where EFA and other conservation actors have been working for over two decades.

Sea Turtles Forever

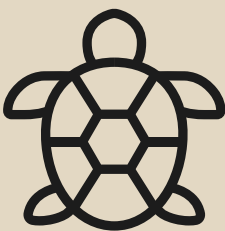

Sea Turtles Forever’s (STF’s) mission focusses on raising conservation awareness to reduce illegal poaching of endangered sea turtle eggs in Costa Rica and reducing microplastic in the Pacific Northwest.

The ERM Foundation provided a grant to Sea Turtles Forever this year, supporting their mission and helping to protect habitat for nesting turtles. In addition, the ERM Foundation also provided pro bono support to implement a robust data management system and support analysis of data collected during marine turtle monitoring and protection patrols. The analysis is critical to securing the permits required by the Costa Rican government. The data management system and yearly population reports also provide an important data source for other conservation groups and sciences.

Reef Check train and organize teams of volunteer divers who collect data on reef health. The information gathered is used by marine resource managers, scientists and policymakers to make science-based ocean management and conservation decisions.

The ERM Foundation provided pro bono support to develop a data visualization portal allowing Reef Check to more readily engage and share the decades of data it has collated, with local communities and key stakeholders. The project initially started with datasets from Reef Check’s LA sites and is now expanding to include sites from across the west coast of the United States, with goals to expand further from there.

Zanzibar Volunteers for Environmental Conservation

Mangroves are key to Zanzibar’s coastal ecosystem, and yet they are rapidly disappearing. Zanzibar Volunteers for Environmental Conservation’s (ZAVECO’s) mission to conserve and protect mangroves revolves around mobilizing volunteers to engage in impactful initiatives, including habitat restoration, community education, and livelihoods improvement. They are committed to fostering sustainable environmental practices and enhancing the conservation of the natural environment.

The ERM Foundation provided pro bono support to ZAVECO for the first time in FY25. A global team of ERM employees provided technical guidance on environmental assessments, sustainable economic development strategies, and the implementation of robust environmental monitoring and evaluation techniques. As mangroves are currently used to provide charcoal for traditional wood stoves used in the communities, the pro bono team also suggested alternative solutions to mangrove charcoal for cooking to ensure sustainable mangrove restoration.

Grant funding

The grant funding program is one of the key mechanisms by which the ERM Foundation has supported organizations to upscale their programs and deliver meaningful impact.

All ERM employees can nominate nonprofit organizations and social enterprises which are aligned to the Foundation’s focus areas. Grants are offered for both one-off projects and for multi-year programs, maximizing the impact to communities and habitats.

In FY25, the ERM Foundation continued its support for Asociación de Autoridades Tradicionales Wayuu Choujashiiwamuin de la Zona de Suluwow (Wuin) for a second year, building on a project that began in FY24 and concluded in FY25, to help establish better water management practices for local communities.

This year, the Foundation provided grant funding and pro bono support to conduct a hydrogeological study, a key document in the decision-making process for investing in a groundwater source that will benefit 85 families in the local community. Community members have been involved in all stages of the project, and the community has received the Indigenous Women’s Leadership Award for its resilience in the face of climate change.

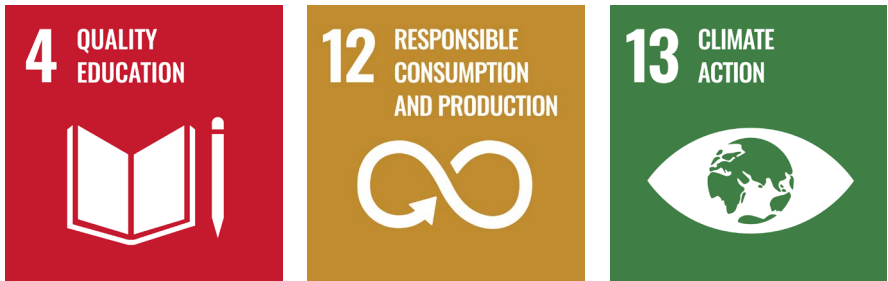

Igapó’s mission is to drive the global transition to a low-carbon economy through the recovery of organic waste. This year, the ERM Foundation provided grant funding to support the installation of an organic composting system at a school in a local low-income community. Funding was also provided to create an environmental educational awareness campaign, aimed at ensuring the continued success and sustainability of the composting system in the school. This led to a reduction in the amount of waste sent to landfill and an increase in the education levels of the children at the school. ERM employees in Brazil also gave pro bono support to provide technical guidance and facilitate knowledge sharing workshops on the new waste and water management systems.

“ERM’s funding for the Compostagem Fundamental project was essential in making its implementation possible. We believe this support was just the starting point for other companies and foundations to follow suit and invest in initiatives that promote not only proper waste management but also environmental education, especially in underserved communities. Brighter Communities Worldwide offers a holistic approach to community engagement, focusing on health, education and economic empowerment for individuals living in the communities they work in.

The ERM Foundation is supporting Brighter Communities Worldwide’s Kericho Climate Resilience Project, which seeks to enable women, girls and youth to reach their full potential. The organization is working to create healthier, empowered, resilient communities and a just and more equitable society for all. The project is building community resilience to climate change by improving health through the installation smokeless stoves in households. Brighter Communities Worldwide is also investing in sustainable livelihoods for women through improved water and sanitation in communities and providing an awareness of sexual reproductive health and rights.

Dana Asia’s vision is to create thriving communities where poverty is alleviated, and inequalities are reduced to foster sustainable development and enable all members of society to achieve their full potential. This year, the Foundation provided grant funding to Dana Asia to enable it to facilitate green microfinance for women microentrepreneurs in Manila, Philippines to bring financial services to the marginalized while targeting plastic waste reduction. The specially designed “eco sari-sari store loan” is designed to help women microentrepreneurs grow their traditional sari-sari stores in an environmentally responsible manner, transforming them into zero-waste stores by replacing items commonly sold in plastic sachets with refill alternatives. This creates a sustainable income stream for impoverished women and their families while safeguarding the environment.

“ERM Funding has enabled the establishment of a network of environmentally-conscious businesses that not only provide a vital income for marginalized microentrepreneurs but also directly contribute to plastic waste reduction. Best yet, the funds can be recycled over and over to considerably scale impact over time. Ocean Purpose Project’s (OPP’s) mission is to create a movement that drives ocean conservation and the prevention of plastic pollution through disruptive and creative projects with large-scale impact. The ERM Foundation is supporting OPP’s Project Tanah Air which focuses on bioremediation using seaweed and using this seaweed to produce biostimulants for use in sustainable agriculture. The project is working to create a healthier marine environment, promote biodiversity and contribute to sustainable aquaculture.

Douniatou’s mission is to support poor communities across Kenya and the ERM Foundation is supported Douniatou’s rescue home for abused and homeless girls, Joy World. Since 2008, the home has provided a safe environment and empowering community to over 700 girls fleeing dangerous family situations.

The Foundation provided grant funding to support borehole drilling at the home. The new and improved borehole will boost the income generation capacity for Joy World by increasing their water capacity, allowing them to grow and sell more bananas which will in turn help fund schooling for the girls who live there. Giving the girls access to a quality education will enhance their ability to secure jobs and sustainable incomes in the future.

The Alley Pond Environmental Center (APEC) is a nonprofit environmental education organization dedicated to educating children and adults in New York, and protecting and preserving Alley Pond Park by advocating for sustainable environmental policies and practices.

Alley Pond Park is an ecologically diverse urban park, providing vital natural spaces for people and hundreds of species of fauna and flora. This year, the ERM Foundation supported APEC’s Urban Biodiversity Project, which allows young adult interns to gain valuable scientific skills while bolstering their relationships with the natural environment. Foundation funding supported the purchase of lab and surveying equipment, enabling interns to monitor the species within the ecosystems of the park.

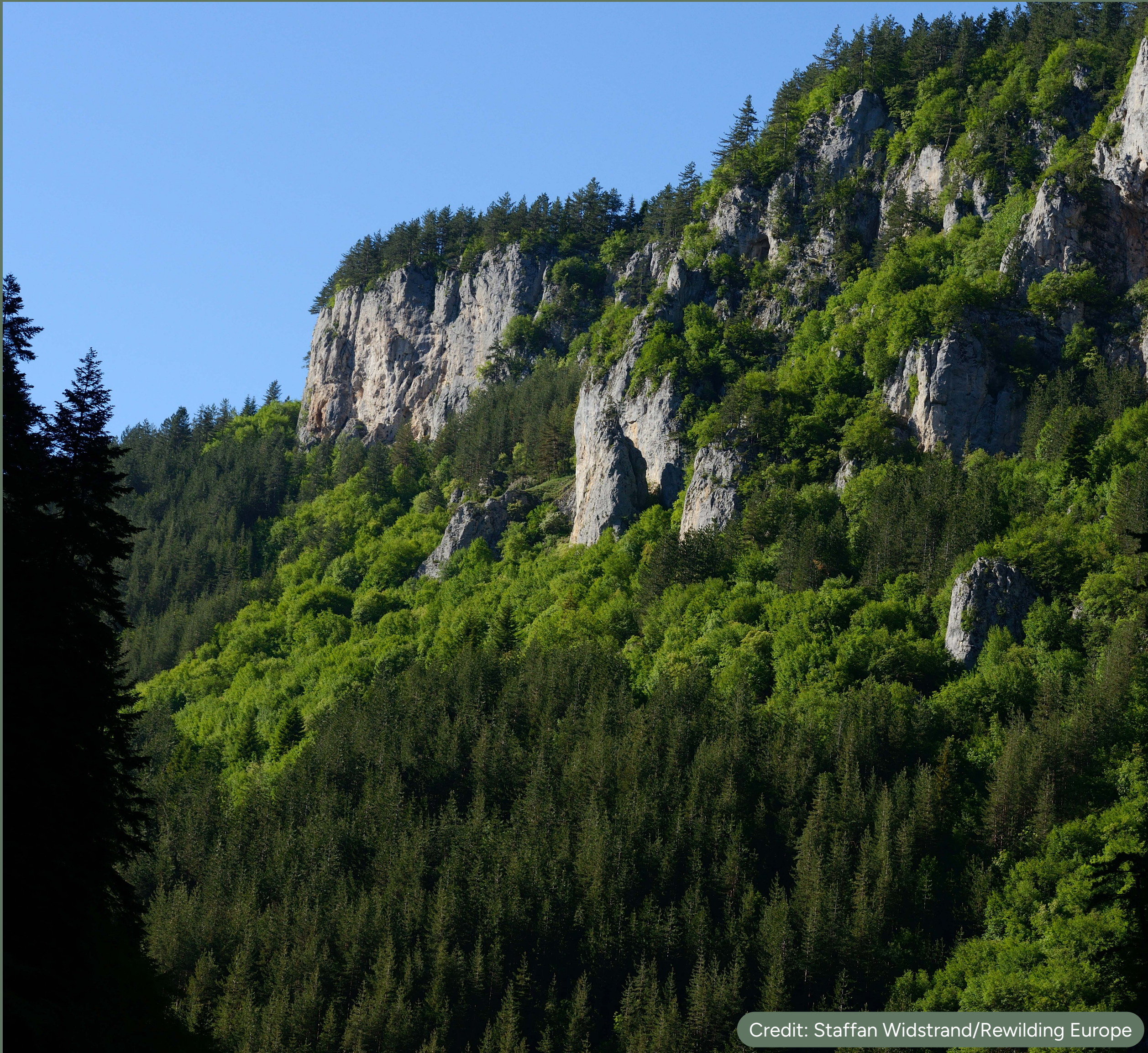
This year, we provided grant funding to drill a water well benefitting over 700 Ugandan community members and build gender-specific bathroom blocks at a secondary school, benefitting 700 students. ERM employees also used technical pro bono time to help Surge for Water improve its impact data collection and measurement. This included the development of an ESG strategy and roadmap.

Rewilding Europe’s mission is to demonstrate the benefits of a wilder nature through the rewilding of diverse European landscapes, creating a Europe that is abundant in nature and more resilient to climate change.

The ERM Foundation is supporting Rewilding Europe’s efforts in the Rhodope Mountains, Bulgaria, which is home to a huge variety of species and habitats. The area is a stronghold of vultures in south-Eastern Europe, and the only breeding spot in Bulgaria for griffon vultures. Rewilding Europe is working in the region to restore food webs, boost biodiversity through mosaic landscape creation and creating a well-known tourism destination built firmly on the land’s assets. Local businesses and regional products will benefit from rewilding activities, which provides incentives for entrepreneurs to invest in the landscape and nature protection efforts.

About the Future Fund

Last year, the ERM Foundation launched its Future Fund program which was made possible thanks to the generous donations of ERM shareholders.

The program is the first of its kind for the Foundation, enabling us to accelerate and scale progress towards the SDGs by investing in longer-term partnerships with organizations whose programs sit at the intersection of climate action, sustainable livelihoods and biodiversity protection.

Our Future Fund supports one project per ERM region, each with a dedicated team of local ERM employees supporting its delivery. These projects were chosen with the help of our ERM employees globally.

The following pages provide more detailed information on each of our Future Fund projects, outlining their achievements to date and their plans for the year ahead.

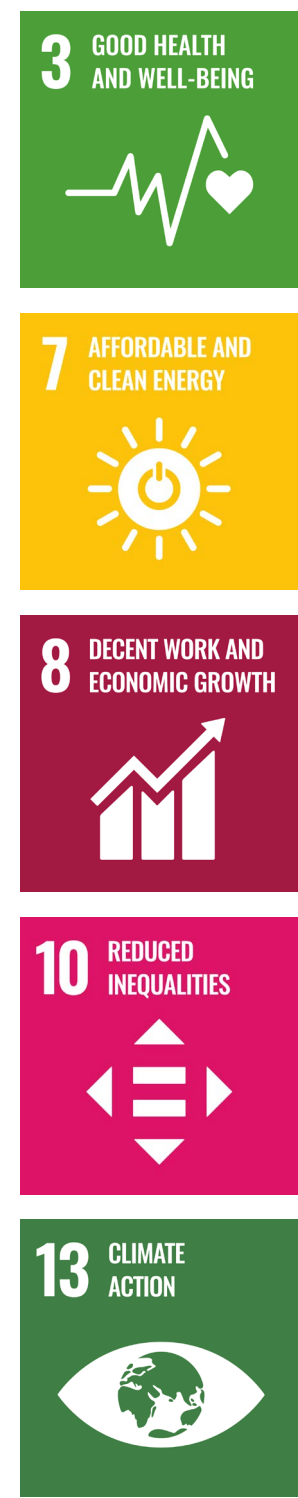

The ERM Foundation is supporting SolarAid’s Mayi Walas program in rural Malawi to help achieve their mission to light up every home, school and clinic in Africa by 2030 by equipping women solar entrepreneurs with everything they need to launch thriving solar businesses. These women not only provide a renewable source of light through the sale of solar lamps but also foster economic growth and improve the quality of life for families as they establish small businesses selling lights in the communities where they live.

In the Foundation’s second year of funding, SolarAid has supported the Mayi Wala groups to progress in their second year of operating solar light businesses. To increase efficiency training is being delivered by local government employees who already operate within the communities. Business Management, Financial Literacy and Group Cohesion training is currently being delivered across all 60 groups. Mayi Walas who have been with the program for at least 12 months and are successfully running their businesses have been invited to ‘graduate’ their businesses to sell more powerful multi-light solar home systems. To help their customers overcome the affordability barrier, Mayi Walas are offering solar home systems on pay-as-you-go plans – accelerating affordable energy access within their communities.

SolarAid’s social enterprise partner Sunny Money provides loans and resources to enable larger lamps (solar home systems) to be sold in communities across Malawi. In FY25, the Foundation provided technical pro bono support to help analyze existing financial data from Sunny Money and develop a more sophisticated model for cashflow forecasting. This will support 36 energy businesses in Malawi, allowing them to better predict cashflow to scale up businesses and further expand the model, giving more people the chance to access clean, safe and affordable energy.

In British Columbia, Canada, kelp forests provide diverse coastal ecosystems that are home to many endangered and economically important species. In recent years, these kelp forests have seen significant decline due destructive human activity in the area. Ocean Wise’s seaforestation program is working to reverse this decline through the development of cost-effective and scalable kelp regeneration techniques, allowing ecosystems to flourish for future generations.

Ocean Wise’s mission is to empower communities and individuals to take action to protect and restore the world’s oceans. The Future Fund is supporting its seaforestation initiative, assisting Ocean Wise to work in partnership with First Nations, coastal communities, industry and other stakeholders in British Columbia. Their projects are supporting the restoration of kelp forest ecosystems by fostering kelp growth, empowering community action and sharing lessons learned with kelp restoration enthusiasts across the country.

In this second year of the Future Fund, Ocean Wise has made progress in closing key knowledge gaps around advanced in-water kelp restoration and monitoring. They have also built further community engagement opportunities for youth to learn about the important role kelp plays in supporting biodiversity, traditional identities and the marine carbon cycle. In collaboration with the Tseshaht First Nation, Ocean Wise is working to integrate scientific and Indigenous knowledge to improve outcomes for kelp restoration, ocean health, First Nations and coastal communities.

In the final year of the Future Fund program, Ocean Wise and its First Nations partners, including the Tseshaht First Nation, will continue to trial, monitor and evaluate planting and seeding techniques, establishing scalable and cost-effective solutions to biodiversity restoration in the area.

The Ocean Foundation’s (TOF’s) mission is to support, strengthen, and promote organizations dedicated to reversing the destruction of ocean environments around the world. The Future Fund program is supporting TOF’s community-based mangrove restoration in the Mexican Caribbean. The goal of the project is to restore hydrological function to over 400 acres of mangrove habitat in the Xcalak Lagoon. The Xcalak Reefs National Park covers over 180 square kilometres and is a National Protected Area. It is part of the second largest coral reef in the world. The restoration will result in the rapid recolonization of the area with mangroves, supporting a healthy ocean environment.

During the second year of the program, TOF has continued the hydrological restoration activities commenced in year one and utilized the innovative SAFE-S restoration concept to create SAFE-SITES. SAFE-S is a restoration concept that includes the selection of environmental conditions that facilitate and enhance natural recruitment of vegetation. TOF also engaged with local communities, hosting workshops to present the progress of restoration efforts and train additional community members in restoration techniques.

In FY25, habitat monitoring using innovative technological solutions was also conducted. This helped to determine the health of existing mangroves and determine where to plant new ones. In the final year of the program, TOF’s plans to continue and expand the hydrological restoration activities and to continue working alongside community members to upskill local volunteers in restoration techniques.

This project is a partnership of The Ocean Foundation with Xcalak Reefs National Park (CONAP), CINVESTAV, ENES-UNAM, Programa Mexicano de Carbono (PMC) and Fundación Mexicana para el Océano (FMO) and habitat restoration experts at Xcalak Reefs National Park.



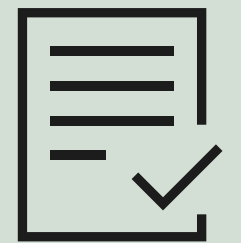

In the A Luoi district of Vietnam, 82% of community members are directly engaged in agro-forestry production. The region is, however, experiencing a sharp degradation in the variety and availability of the medicinal plants which local livelihoods rely on. The Center for Rural Development in Central Vietnam (CRD) is working to change this by improving biodiversity in the region, simultaneously contributing to improving the lives of local stakeholders and protecting the region against climate change.

CRD’s mission is to conduct research, training, technological transfer and policy advocacy, leading to sustainable rural development. The ERM Foundation is supporting its project to promote the conservation of indigenous medicinal plants alongside livelihood improvement for the ethnic minorities in the A Luoi district. The recent decline in biodiversity has impacted community health, Indigenous knowledge, people’s livelihoods and the local environment. Over generations, communities have used medicinal plants to treat many diseases such as hepatitis B, dysentery and snake bites.




In the second year of the Future Fund program, CRD continued to strengthen relationships with local stakeholders across 15 forest communities. Local stakeholders are now actively participating in, and contributing to, the management and conservation of natural plant resources. Community managed indigenous medicinal plant nurseries have been created and are expected to provide at least 15,000 seedlings a year. For the final year of Future Fund, CRD plans to continue expanding and establishing its work with local communities, increasing local knowledge and expanding the capacities for nurseries.

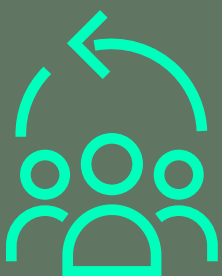
